NFL WEEK 2: RAVENS (1-0) AT EAGLES (1-0)

SEPT. 16, 2012 • 1 P.M. ET • LINCOLN FINANCIAL FIELD (69,144)



JUST THE FACTS

- The Baltimore Ravens play their first road game of the season when they travel to Philadelphia to face the Eagles this Sunday, Sept. 16, at Lincoln Financial Field at 1 p.m. The Ravens stopped the visiting Bengals, 44-13, last Monday night, while Philly won at Cleveland, 17-16.
- The Ravens exploded for 27 second-half points, including S Ed Reed's 34-yard interception for a touchdown in the victory over Cincinnati. Running most of the game from a no-huddle offense, QB Joe Flacco completed 21 of 29 passes for 299 yards, with touchdown throws to WR Anguan Boldin and TE Dennis Pitta (a team-leading 5 catches for 73 yards). RB Ray Rice ran for 2 TDs, finishing with 10 carries for 68 yards and 3 catches for 25 more. Baltimore sacked QB Andy Dalton 4 times, with 2 coming from DT Haloti Ngata.
- Baltimore, which went undefeated in the AFC North in 2011, is the only team in the division to win its season opener. (Pittsburgh dropped a 31-19 decision at Denver in last Sunday night's special.) Three teams from the Ravens' division earned the playoffs last season.
- Baltimore is the only team to earn the playoffs in each of the past four seasons. The Ravens have also won at least one postseason game each of those years, including 2011 when they advanced to the AFC Championship and lost a gut-wrenching 23-20 game at New England.
- Following their trip to Philadelphia, the Ravens will play back-toback nationally-televised games when they host the Patriots on Sept. 23 on NBC and then the Browns at M&T Bank Stadium four days later on Thursday, Sept. 27, on the NFL Network.

HARBS SAYS

"There is meaning when we say, 'A player plays like a Raven.' A lot of it is the type of player we bring here. We look for a certain personality. We look for players who love football and all that comes with it: the preparation, the lifting of weights, the physicality, the teamwork, the fast practices – all of that. "It would be foolish to say Lewis is the same as he was a decade ago, but it would be equally silly not to be impressed with what he's doing. The ability to play his position at such a high level all these years later after having long reached his status as the best middle linebacker of all time remains a remarkable feat. ... Maybe this defense will continue to be dominant because its still-quick leader continues to beat down running backs. And time."

With his 34-yard interception for a touchdown in Monday's victory, S Ed Reed surpassed Rod Woodson for the most interception yards in NFL history. Reed has 58 INTs for 1,497 yards. (Including playoffs, he has 66 thefts for 1,693 yards.) Below are the all-time leaders:

Passes of 20+ Note: The Ravens racked up six plays of 20-or-more yards against the Bengals last week, all through the air. QB Joe Flacco completed passing longs of 52 (WR Torrey Smith), 34t (WR Anquan Boldin) 25 (WR Jacoby Jones) and 25 (TE Dennis Pitta).

LAST GAME: BAL. 44, CIN. 13

The Ravens started the season unveiling a no-huddle offense that propelled the team to an impressive 44-13 victory over the visiting Bengals on Sept. 10. QB Joe Flacco was superb, completing 21 of 29 passes for 299 yards with 2 touchdowns. Baltimore leaped out to a 10-0 first-quarter lead on a 46-yard K Justin Tucker field goal and a 7-yard RB Ray Rice TD run. A Flacco-to-WR Anquan Boldin 34-yard TD pass made the score 17-3 in the second quarter. Cincy made the score 17-10 at the half when RB BenJarvus Green-Ellis ran for a 6-yard TD on fourth-and-one. But the Ravens then exploded for 27 second-half points after the Bengals closed the gap to 17-13 on the first series of the third quarter (K Mike Nugent's 19-yard FG). Highlights included **S Ed Reed** returning a QB Andy Dalton interception 34 yards for a TD and Flacco's 10-yard TD toss to **TE Dennis Pitta**. Pitta's 5 catches for 73 yards were highs for the Ravens. Rice scored 2 TDs, rushing 10 times for 68 yards and adding 3 catches for 25 more. Tucker connected on 3 FGs (46, 40 and 39 yards) in his debut. Dalton was 22-of-37 for 221 yards, completing 8 passes for 86 yards to WR Andrew Hawkins. Dalton was sacked 4 times, however, twice by DT Haloti Ngata. Green-Ellis gained 91 yards on 18 carries.

What will it be like playing in your hometown? "It's a great opportunity, and it's somewhat of a dream to be able to play amongst my friends, my family, my peers, and all of the people that watched me grow up

and become the man and the player that I am now."

You boxed when you were younger. How would you compare boxing to life? "Everything is a fight. Boxing is just you in that ring against the other person. In life, sometimes you have a support system, sometimes you have people that are coaching you up in that fight. But, in each and every one of them, you have to fight, you have to be able to hold your own, and that's what my life has taught me. That's what boxing has summed up."

What is your most memorable fight? "My most memorable fight was in the Silver Gloves, but it was before I got to the finals. Back in those days, that's when everybody was celebrating and doing all of that dancing when they won at the end. Brother Nazim Richards, he's very popular in Philadelphia ... I knocked a guy out, and I just walked out of the ring, and I remember him saying, 'That's how you are supposed to do it – not all of that dancing, just beat them and get out.' You knew you were supposed to do that."

Who is your role model? "My No. 1 role model is my uncle. I just like the way he represented himself as a man, as a father and as a husband. He just went to work every day, complained as little as he could. He stepped in and played a father figure for me when I had no father figure. The information that he gave me was valuable. They always say, 'No boy can become a man without a man's guidance,' and that's truly what he gave to me – a man's guidance. I had so many other people in my life, but what he gave me on how to be a man, that just made me who I am."

What did you dream of becoming when you were young? "When I was a little kid, I wanted to be Superman. When I got older, I just wanted to be better than what I had seen; that's all I wanted. For an occupation, I would want to be a motivational speaker. I would want to go on motivational speaking circuits and be able to inspire other people and tell them my story, talk about stories that I've heard and give them something to make them push a little bit more. I've had a lot of inspirations, and those people have touched me in a certain way, and I want to be able to touch others."

What would be your message? "Let's bring it back to boxing: 'The fight ain't over until it's over."

QUOTH THE RAVENS BALTIMORE POOTBALL

"Harbaugh's greatest strengths as a coach are his attention to detail, motivation and focus, all of which are vital after an offseason like this one. Walk the halls of Ravens headquarters, and you'll see one of Harbaugh's favorite slogans throughout the building: W.I.N. (What's Important Now). 'You try to take care of business today, what's important right now,' Harbaugh said. 'Today, let's do our job, and then the future takes care of itself. That's how it applies.'"

SportsIllustrated.com's Chris Burke on the Ravens' 44-13 win over AFC North rival Cincinnati:

"So what's a scarier development for the Baltimore Ravens' future opponents and their rivals in the AFC North: That Joe Flacco and Baltimore's new no-huddle offense looked absolutely lethal in picking Cincinnati apart in Monday night's 44-13 victory? Or that, in the second half with the game still in doubt, Baltimore was able to rely on its defense, even without Terrell Suggs, to absolutely slam the door and put the game away?"

S Ed Reed on the 2012 Ravens, following Baltimore's Week 1 win over Cincinnati:

"It's a team now. It's a full team. It's a very good team with a great offense and a great defense and great special teams. We just have to put it all together. It's something this organization has been building toward for a long time."

Head coach John Harbaugh on how good QB Joe Flacco can be:

"Scary good. That's probably the word right there. I'll go with that. We've always stood up here and we've always, all of our coaches, the organization, we know what we've got in this guy. He has won a lot of football games, and it's easy for the pundits and prognosticators [to criticize], as my dad will say. That's what you do; you try to figure out and write the stories. Joe Flacco is going to be a great player. Joe Flacco is a great player. Joe Flacco has been a great player."

LB Ray Lewis on if he is surprised S Ed Reed passed Hall of Famer Rod Woodson's interception return yards record:

"No. Like I said, for me personally, because I'm close friends with both of those guys, I've witnessed it on both sides. To see Rod Woodson pick them off and run, and now I'm running behind Ed when he picks them off, I just think it's poetry. It's poetry to see those guys do what they do."

RB Ray Rice on having a balanced offensive attack:

"It's great to see this offense evolving with the changes that are happening in the NFL. This is a pass-friendly league now, but we still do have some running backs in the league, including myself. We can evolve with the change, which means that's catching the ball, running the ball and pass protection. That's what the running back position is now. The faster you can evolve with the change, the longer you're going to last in the NFL."

NFL Network and FOX analyst Brian Billick on John Harbaugh:

"John has been brilliant. Part of it is because he came into a team that was – I don't want to sound self-serving – but was pretty good, and a good, sound organization. It's the same reason whether it be a Bill Belichick or now Tom Coughlin, a Mike McCarthy. Once you have a certain level of success, it's kind of assumed so you don't give them credit for continuing to have that success. But John's been brilliant in what he has done in Baltimore and has them on the cusp. They're going to be there again [this] year."

NFL.com's Gregg Rosenthal on the Ravens' drafting success:

"If the NFL was a fantasy football league, the Baltimore Ravens are that guy who always makes the rest of the room say, 'Nice pick.' The Ravens take value. Year after year, they see a blue-chip talent fall for some bogus reason or another. And then they snap them up, coach them up and make them into Pro Bowlers."

ESPN.com's Bill Williamson on the Ravens organization:

"The Ravens get it. They have one of the best front offices in the NFL and prove it year after year. There is no reason to think this will change any time soon."

CBS analyst Ian Eagle on TEs Dennis Pitta and Ed Dickson:

"From what I've seen of Dennis Pitta, he has a chance to be a star. And with the way the NFL is headed, the combination of Pitta and Dickson could be lethal."

ESPN analyst and former Colts president Bill Polian on new Ravens QBs coach Jim Caldwell and QB Joe Flacco:

"[Caldwell] is a tremendous support mechanism, a sounding board, a guy who knows the position, knows the demands of the position and can help Joe through the rough spots. They're both in it together, and Jim is a great support for any quarterback. I'm a big Jim Caldwell fan, and he will be of immense value to Joe."

The Sporting News' Vinnie Iyer on Ravens G Marshal Yanda:

"He plays right guard like a tackle, a position he also has experience playing. Smooth and smart, Yanda brings good fundamentals in using his feet and hands to technically get the better of his defensive assignments. At 6-3, 315 pounds, he doesn't necessarily blow away opponents with his size, but he knows how to consistently outwork them."

EAGLES SNAPSHOT

Overview: The Eagles began the 2011 campaign 4-8 and then won their final four contests to finish 8-8, tied for second in the NFC East. To kick off the season last week, the Eagles edged Cleveland, 17-16, after a **QB Michael Vick**-to-**TE Clay Harbor** 6-yard TD strike with just over 1 minute remaining in the game. Following Week 2, Philadelphia travels to Arizona (9/23), hosts the New York Giants (9/30) and then travels to Pittsburgh (10/7) for the third of four AFC North showdowns.

Andy Reid: Reid embarks on his 14th season at the helm in Philadelphia, making him the NFL's longest-tenured head coach. Since taking the reins in 1999, Reid has led the Eagles to 137 wins (including postseason), 10 playoff victories, six division titles and five NFC Championship appearances. He has earned NFL Coach of the Year honors three times. Reid's win total and winning percentage (.610) are both franchise records.

Offense: Following Week 1, the Eagles rank second in total offense (456.0 ypg), including sixth in both passing (306.0 ypg) and rushing (150.0 ypg). **QB Michael Vick** completed 29 of 56 passes for 317 yards and 2 TDs last week, but also threw 4 INTs. **WR Jeremy Maclin** had a team-high 7 receptions for 96 yards and 1 score, while **RB LeSean McCoy** finished with 110 rushing yards on 20 carries (5.5 avg.).

Defense: Following its opener, Philadelphia leads the league in total defense (210.0 ypg), including first against the pass (111.0 ypg) and 17th in run stop (99.0 ypg). The Eagles tie for a league-high 4 INTs, including 2 each from **FS Kurt Coleman** and **CB Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie**. **DE Jason Babin**, who finished third in the NFL in sacks last season (18), recorded his first QB drop of the year at Cleveland. The Eagles held Browns rookie QB Brandon Weeden to 12-of-35 passing for 118 yards, 4 INTs and a 5.1 rating.

- Ravens RBs coach **Wilbert Montgomery** holds Philadelphia franchise records for career rushing yards (6,538) and attempts (1,465), the single-season rushing record (1,512 in 1979) and is also second on the team's all-time rushing TDs list (45), all set during his eight-year career with the club from 1977-84. Montgomery was elected into the Eagles Honor Roll in 1987 and was also elected into the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame in November 2011.
- Eagles LBs coach **Mike Caldwell** played LB for the Browns from 1993-95 and made the move with the team to Baltimore in 1996.
- Ravens **G Bobbie Williams** was originally selected by the Eagles in the second round (61st overall) of the 2000 NFL Draft. He spent the first four years of his career in Philly, seeing action in 33 games.
- Ravens **S Sean Considine** was selected by the Eagles in the fourth round (102nd overall) of the 2005 NFL Draft and played for Philadelphia from 2005-08, recording a career-high 107 tackles (66 solo) in 2006.

High School/Hometown Connections

- Ravens owner **Steve Bisciotti** was born in Philadelphia before moving to Baltimore as a child.
- Ravens LB Jameel McClain and director of player programs Harry Swayne both hail from Philadelphia. Swayne attended Cardinal Dougherty HS and McClain went to George Washington HS. Ravens QB Joe Flacco is from Audubon, NJ, just outside Philadelphia.
- Five Ravens attended high school in Pennsylvania: Secondary coach **Teryl Austin** Sharon, team president **Dick Cass** Mercersburg Academy (Mercersburg), **G/C Gino Gradkowski** Seton-La Salle (Pittsburgh), WRs coach **Jim Hostler** Bethel Park and **RB Bernard Pierce** Glen Mills.
- Ravens rookie **K Justin Tucker** and Eagles rookie **QB Nick Foles** played alongside each other at Westlake (Austin, TX) HS.

College Connections

- Ravens **QB Tyrod Taylor** (2007-10) and Eagles **QB Michael Vick** (1999-2000) are two of Virginia Tech's all-time standout players. After just two years with the Hokies, Vick was tabbed the No. 1-overall selection in the 2001 NFL Draft, while Taylor recently became the school's all-time passer his senior season (2010), throwing for 7,017 career yards.
- Ravens **RB Bernard Pierce** (2009-11) played on the opposite side of the ball of Eagles **S Jaiquawn Jarrett** (2007-10) at the University of Temple in Philadelphia. Pierce scored a school-record 53 rushing TDs (and 54 total TDs) during his career.
- Ravens rookie **DE DeAngelo Tyson** (2008-11) and Eagles rookie **CB Brandon Boykin** (2008-11) played for the Georgia defense. Tyson finished his senior season with 20 tackles, including 3.5 TFL and 11 QBHs, while Boykin posted 55 tackles, 3 INTs and 2 FFs.

COACH HARBS



In his fifth year as head coach, John Harbaugh has led Baltimore to a playoff berth in each of his first four seasons (marking a franchise first with four-consecutive postseason berths). "Harbs" is the only head coach in NFL history to win a playoff game in each of his first four seasons. He has led the Ravens to 45 regular season wins during this span, tving for

second in the NFL, and he has guided the Ravens to two AFC Championship games (2008 & 2011). Harbs owns a 5-4 playoff record.

In his 2008 rookie campaign, the Ravens advanced to the AFC Championship game after winning at Miami (27-9) and at top-seeded Tennessee, 13-10. Pittsburgh, the eventual Super Bowl champion, stopped the Ravens, 23-14, in the AFC title matchup. In 2009, Baltimore dominated at New England, 33-14, in the Wild Card game before dropping a 20-3 contest at Super

Bowl-bound Indianapolis in the Divisional Round. After earning a 12-4 mark in 2010, the Ravens topped Kansas City (30-7) in the Wild Card playoff, becoming the only team to win at least one playoff game in each of the last three seasons. The Ravens then dropped a 31-24 Divisional Round contest at Pittsburgh, which advanced to the Super Bowl.

During the Harbaugh Era (since 2008)...

- Baltimore is the only NFL team to advance to the playoffs each of the last four years and the only team to have won at least one playoff game in each of those postseasons.
- The Ravens own a 45-20 regular season record. Including playoffs (5-4), they are 50-24 in the Harbaugh Era, tying for second in the NFL in total wins since his Baltimore arrival.

COORDINATORS NOTES

CAM'S ATTACK



Now in his fifth season as the Ravens' offensive coordinator, **Cam Cameron**'s impact has been significant. In 2011, **QB Joe Flacco** produced his third-straight 3,500-yard/20-touchdown passing season, while RB Ray Rice led the NFL with 2,068 yards from scrimmage. In 2009, the Ravens were the NFL's ninth best

in scoring (24.4 ppg), up from 24th in 2007, while setting team records for most total TDs (47) and most rushing TDs (22). In his first season in Baltimore (2008), Cameron built a creative offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in rushing (148.5 ypg), first in time of possession (33:10) and 11th in points per game (24.1 ppg).

Cameron brought his unique offensive mind to Baltimore after one year as the Miami Dolphins' head coach. His successful stints with the NFL's Chargers and Redskins and the NCAA's Indiana Hoosiers and Michigan Wolverines have been celebrated.

Under Cameron's guidance in five seasons (2008-12)...

- The Ravens have rushed for 131.2 yards per game, fourth most in the NFL. Baltimore also has 70 rushing TDs, tying for third most.
- Baltimore has committed only 87 turnovers during this span, the NFL's fourth fewest. (Ravens set a team record with just 20 give-aways in 2010 and posted a +2 turnover ratio in 2011.)
- The Ravens' 23.9 points per game during this span ranks eighth.

PRODUCTION UNDER CAM

The Ravens' "O" has been consistently effective since **Cam Cameron** took the reins in 2008. Over the past four full seasons, Baltimore has ranked in the top half of the NFL in scoring each year, while in 2009, the Ravens posted the second-most yards in team history.

- In each of the past three full seasons (2009-11), **QB Joe Flacco** and GB's Aaron Rodgers are the only NFL QBs to throw for at least 3,600 yards and 20 TDs while posting 12 INTs or less.
- Baltimore's "O" posted a franchise-record 553 yards in 2011's Week 3 win at STL (9/25). The Ravens' top 4 all-time single-game outputs have come during the **John Harbaugh/Cam Cameron** Era.
- During his time as coordinator, Baltimore has posted at least 30 points on 23 different occasions (including 44 in 2012's Week 1 win over Cincy) and owns a 22-1 record in those games.

- The Ravens have piled up at least 375 total net yards 18 times since 2008, producing a 17-1 record in those games.
- The Ravens have rushed for at least 190 yards 11 times under Cameron, earning an 11-0 record. Baltimore is also 29-2 when rushing for at least 125 yards in a game, including 6-0 in 2011.

PEES PROMOTED



Dean Pees, a nine-year NFL-coaching veteran, was promoted to defensive coordinator on Jan. 27 after guiding the Ravens' LBs for two seasons. He is the sixth "D" coordinator in franchise history. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, now leads the vaunted Baltimore unit. which has

finished as the NFL's third-best scoring defense four-consecutive years (16.6 ppg in 2011). The four-straight years ties an NFL record for consecutive seasons of being in the Top 3 for points allowed.

Pees leads a unit that during the John Harbaugh Era (2008-12)...

• Has allowed the NFL's second-fewest points (16.2) and the second-fewest net yards (292.8) per game during this span.

Ozzie Newsome's legacy is unlike any the game has seen. Known throughout all of sports as a premier leader, Newsome is a Hall of Fame player, the architect of Baltimore's Super Bowl XXXV championship team and an elite personnel evaluator who became the NFL's first African American general manager.



THE DOMINANT DT



One of the NFL's most disruptive forces, **DT Haloti Ngata** was named to his third Pro Bowl (as a starter) in 2011. Perhaps the NFL's most athletic DT, Ngata stops the run (397 career tackles), rushes the passer (19 career sacks) and even drops into coverage (3 career INTs).
