

JUST THE FACTS

• The Baltimore Ravens (6-4) head south to the New Orleans Saints (4-6) for a Monday Night Football showdown at the Mercedes-Benz Superdome on Nov. 24. Kickoff for the Week 12 primetime battle is at 8:30 p.m. Baltimore is coming off its bye week, while the Saints dropped a 27-10 game to Cincinnati at home last Sunday.

• The Ravens are looking to sweep the NFC South in 2014 after already posting victories at home vs. Carolina (38-10) and Atlanta (29-7) and on the road at Tampa Bay (48-17). (Baltimore has outscored NFC South foes 115-34 this season.)

• Baltimore is in a tight battle in the ultra-competitive AFC North, which is the NFL's only division that boasts four teams above .500. The Ravens, who have already played five of their six division games this season (a Week 17 home battle with the Browns remains), are behind Cincinnati (6-3-1) and Pittsburgh (7-4) in the standings and ahead of 6-4 Cleveland (Baltimore holds the head-to-head tie-breaker).

• After falling behind 7-0 in the first quarter to the visiting Titans, who were coming off their bye week, the Ravens rebounded to secure a 21-7 victory in their last game on Nov. 9. Baltimore's defense was stout, limiting the Titans to 8 punts and an interception on their final 9 possessions of the game. Tennessee produced just 45 yards in the second half, and until the Titans' final possession of the game, the Ravens held them to 7 three-and-outs and 1 four-and-out over almost three quarters (since the end of the first).

• Following this weekend's game at New Orleans, the Ravens will host San Diego on Nov. 30 and travel to Miami (Dec. 7) after that.

HARBS SAYS

"We focus on our team, but every now and then, you need to rise up and take a peek and see what's going on around the league. RAVENS HISTORICALLY STRONG AFTER THE BYE WEEK

NOTE THE QUOTE

SECONDARY/ASSISTANT HEAD COACH STEVE SPAGNUOLO ON DEPTH "We miss Jimmy [Smith] and missed 'Webby' [Lardarius Webb] when he wasn't there, but guys have stepped up. We've tried to structure some things to help guys as they're getting their feet underneath them. The closest thing I can remember was in 2011, when we were in St. Louis, we had eight corners on Injured Reserve. You can't afford to lose anybody, and when you start losing them at one position, that's tough. We have the luxury of having other guys step up. Kudos to [Ravens general manager and executive vice president] Ozzie [Newsome] and [Ravens assistant general manager] Eric [DeCosta] in getting Danny [Gorrer]. And then Anthony [Levine] developing like he has, I think it has been great. We get Asa [Jackson] back next month. We get some other guys in and out there. 'Webby' will continue to play well. I think we'll be OK."

Some people fear that kicking is being faded out of the game. What can the NFL do to put more of the "foot" in football? "I don't think the game needs to be changed. Taking parts of the game away for safety reasons, but then modifying other parts of the game in order to make it more interesting, there

is a lack of consistency there. To that tune, I will be consistent and say that the game should not be changed. Fantasy football is all good and well, but that's fantasy. Reality football is great and doesn't need to be changed. I'm too much of a purist to say, 'Let's change it just because it sounds fun.' The scoring system has worked well for so long. There's no need to mix it up unless there's an issue of safety concern, which there isn't."

Fox Sports named you "The Most Interesting Man in the NFL" last year. Who is the most interesting man in the Ravens' locker room? "That's tough, because we have a lot of interesting characters. For defense, it goes without saying that Terrell Suggs is an interesting guy. He's a renaissance man in his own right. He's into the fine arts – especially cinema. On offense, Kyle Juszczyk. He's a pretty interesting guy – so interesting, I think it would make total sense for him to be the next contestant on The Bachelor."

What comes to mind when you hear "Superdome?" "There are so many emotions – all positive, like pride, legacy and love. That [2012] group that came through there for Super Bowl XLVII, as the saying goes, 'We will walk together forever.' That said, I'm still pretty early on in this 'kicking footballs thing.' The more of those experiences that I can be a part of, especially with such a great group like we have around here, the better."

Who is your favorite all-time kicker? "It's a tie between three guys, in no particular order: Matt Stover, Adam Vinatieri and Phil Dawson. They are all great kickers, but even better guys. What I respect about them is they've done it for a long time, they've done it in tough conditions, and they've done it consistently well. I just hope I can do the same in my career."

Ping Pong is a big activity in the Ravens' locker room. What does that do for the team? "They are all 'C' words: cardio, camaraderie and competiveness. I get a pretty good sweat going when I play several games in a row. It gets the legs warmed up. With Ping Pong, not only are you working out your body, but it's also your mind. Especially with Joe [Flacco], he and I get into some intense matches."

What comes to mind when you hear the following: John Harbaugh: "Leader, friend and mentor." Jerry Rosburg: "All three of those apply, too, but for Jerry, I'll also say 'stoic.'" Sam Koch: "Salty competitor."

NOTE OF THE WEEK III

K Justin Tucker is a perfect 10-for-10 in three career games played indoors. Those figures include a 2-of-2 output at the Superdome in Super Bowl XLVII (19- and 38-yard FGs) and an incredible 6-of-6 performance on Monday Night Football at Detroit in 2013 (Dec. 16). In that 18-16 Ravens' victory, "Tuck" became the first NFL kicker ever to connect from the 20-, 30-, 40-, 50- & 60-yard range in a contest (his 61-yarder with :38 remaining won the game).

QUOTH THE RAVENS BALTIMORE FOOTBALL

"The Baltimore Ravens' season is only a little over halfway complete, and this year's rookie class has already distinguished itself as the most immediately productive in coach John Harbaugh's seven seasons. No other group of rookies have been on the field more than this year's one. Seven first-year players have logged at least 95 snaps this season. How special is that? The previous six rookie classes have never had more than four players contribute that much for an entire season, much less the first 10 games of a season like these current rookies."

Head coach John Harbaugh on what he thinks of the competitive race in the AFC North at this point:

"I probably feel the same way I felt about it when the season opened. It's the best division in football. That's only going to serve to make us all better in the end. It's going to be a dog fight right to the end. We just need to do our part. We understand how good the other three teams are in our division and how well they're going to play down the stretch. That should just serve further notice to us in terms of how we'll need to play."

TE Owen Daniels on how impressed he is with the way the Ravens organization takes care of distractions:

"I think everyone does a great job of that – top to bottom. We have great leadership starting from the top. [Head] coach [John] 'Harbs' [Harbaugh] does an awesome job of keeping things in perspective and keeping us focused on the right thing, keeping us focused on things that we can worry about. If you can't change it, there's no need to worry about it that much if we can't do anything about it. But we're focused on what we can do. All the guys in the locker room have a good head on their shoulders, and like I said, it comes from the top down."

OLB Terrell Suggs on him and OLB Elvis Dumervil collecting the bulk of the Ravens' sacks this season:

"We always give each other a hard time. He's leading right now; I'm trying to catch him. But I think what we're both doing is pretty phenomenal for the team. I think it's fun, it's exciting. I never had a guy on the other side of the [defense] as a pass-rush specialist like that, so it's definitely a good thing for the team."

OLB Elvis Dumervil on OLB Terrell Suggs closing in on 100 career sacks (Suggs is at 99.5):

"You get to three digits, 100 sacks, I think those are yellow jacket [Hall of Fame] types of accolades. He has been a great player for a long time. Whenever you get to almost 100 sacks, that's a hell of an accomplishment."

RB Justin Forsett looking ahead to the final six games of the season after his 721-yard rushing start:

"I want to be able to do more than this in the next half [of the season]. There's always going to be doubters. There's always going to be people that want to limit me and put me in boxes. It's my job to go out there and try to break them."

Fox Sports' Brendon Ayanbadejo, a former Raven, on head coach John Harbaugh having the Ravens poised for a second-half surge: "John Harbaugh and the Ravens have a plan to get into the playoffs. They are built for November and December. ... They get stronger as the season progresses. And this is how they do it: They implement a taper in the second half. Training camps are long, physical and grueling. They believe this builds a season-long callous. The first half of the season, the Ravens continue to have hard, physical practices. However, in the second half, the shoulder pads come off, meeting times in the morning are pushed back. Practices become more mental than physical. This translates into better performance on the field and well-rested and recovered players. Harbaugh took this formula from his mentor, Andy Reid, during the time they spent in Philadelphia."

ESPN.com's Matt Williamson on the Ravens' chances of winning the AFC North after 10 games played:

"Baltimore has the best roster and best coach in my opinion. The Ravens have that 'been there, done that' attribute as well and are known to get hot down the stretch. The late bye could do them and Pittsburgh well from a health perspective. It's a super tight race."

Defensive coordinator Dean Pees on if he is surprised by what LB C.J. Mosley has accomplished so far this season:

"No. He is everything we thought he was and hoped he'd be. And I think he's playing at a very high level for a rookie. He's a very, very intelligent football player, besides just being a good football player and a good athlete. He's a very, very intelligent guy. A lot of times, rookies come in, and you have to teach them how to study. And that was what was always great about having Ray [Lewis] and those guys around. They kind of followed his lead for a while. [Mosley] has Daryl [Smith], and Daryl does a great job. But he's [the] kind of guy that was like that when he came in. That's what C.J. is, and it's very evident in how he plays."

LB C.J. Mosley on what makes NT Brandon Williams suited to play nose tackle:

"Pretty much, he's a bully on the defensive line. He sets the tone, and he knows how to keep guys off me."

CB Anthony Levine on being named a starter in Week 10:

"I've been waiting for this for a long time. To call myself a starting something in the NFL – whether it was safety or corner – I was happy to say that."

LAST GAME'S RECAP

BALTIMORE RAVENS - 21, TENNESSEE TITANS - 7 M&T Bank Stadium • Baltimore, MD • Nov. 9, 2014

After falling behind 7-0 in the first quarter to the visiting Titans, who were coming off their bye week, the Ravens rebounded to secure a 21-7 victory on Nov. 9 at M&T Bank Stadium. While the Titans produced 2 long drives and 142 total yards in that initial period, the Ravens ran just 4 plays for 8 yards. By halftime, Baltimore's offense had just 86 total yards and no third-down conversions. Meanwhile, the Ravens' defense came alive, holding the Titans to 8 punts and an interception on their final 9 possessions of the game. Tennessee produced just 45 yards in the second half, the fifth fewest ever allowed by the Ravens in the final two quarters. Until the Titans' final possession of the game, the Ravens held them to 7 three-and-outs and 1 four-and-out over almost three guarters (since the end of the first). Titans rookie QB Zach Mettenberger was sacked 5 times, 2.5 by OLB Elvis Dumervil and 1.5 by OLB Terrell Suggs. The Titans opened the game with a 15-play, 79-yard drive that ended when RB Shonn Greene fumbled (forced by DT Haloti Ngata) at the 1-yard line, and the ball was recovered by Baltimore's DE Lawrence Guy. Tennessee came right back after a Ravens' three-and-out with a 9-play, 58-yard series that ended with Mettenberger hitting RB Leon Washington for a 3-yard touchdown and a 7-0 lead. The Ravens tied the game at 7 in the second quarter on RB Justin Forsett's 9-yard TD scamper around the left side. Forsett's 11-yard sprint to the end zone in the third quarter gave the Ravens a 14-7 lead. That was increased to 21-7 at the 13:09 mark of the fourth guarter after QB Joe Flacco hit WR Torrey Smith with a 32-yard TD strike. The Ravens ended the game with two kneel-downs at the Titans' 1-yard line. Flacco finished with 16 completions on 27 attempts for 169 yards. Smith caught 5 of those for 75 yards, while Forsett led all rushers with 112 yards on 20 carries.

• Ravens head coach John Harbaugh and offensive line coach Juan Castillo and Saints head coach Sean Payton and assistant head coach/LBs coach Joe Vitt served on the Philadelphia Eagles' staff during the 1998 season. Harbaugh was the Eagles' special teams coordinator, while Payton was the quarterbacks coach.

• Ravens secondary/assistant head coach **Steve Spagnuolo** served as the Saints' defensive coordinator during the 2012 season. Spagnuolo led a defensive unit that finished with 15 INTs (including 4 returned for TDs) and 11 FFs.

• Ravens assistant defensive backs coach **Chris Hewitt** signed with New Orleans as a rookie free agent in 1997 and played in 39 games (four starts). Hewitt played as a defensive back, serving primarily as a special teams performer for the Saints.

• From 2000-04, Ravens east-regional scout **Andy Weidl** was the Saints' northeast area scout and covered Big East and ACC schools.

• Saints assistant head coach/LBs coach **Joe Vitt** was the strength/ quality control coach for the Baltimore Colts from 1979-81. He was also a three-year letterman (1974–75, 1977) as a linebacker at Towson (MD) State University.

• Ravens **CB Danny Gorrer** was initially signed as an undrafted free agent by the Saints in 2009.

• Saints **G Ben Grubbs** was originally selected by Baltimore as the 29th-overall pick in the 2007 draft and played five season for the team. He started a total of 70 games, earning Pro Bowl honors in 2011.

• Saints **K Shayne Graham** was signed by the Ravens in June of 2010, but was released before the start of the regular season. Graham was again signed by the Ravens on December 21, 2011, making 2 FGs and 2 PATs in one game, before being released.

COLLEGE CONNECTIONS

• Between the two teams, five players have won BCS National Championships at Alabama over the past several seasons. Those with two rings include Ravens LB C.J. Mosley (2011-12) and OLB Courtney Upshaw (2009 and 2012) and Saints S Vinnie Sunseri (2011-12). Saints RB Mark Ingram and DL Brandon Deaderick won one title (2009) with Upshaw. Sunseri's father, Sal, was the assistant head coach/linebackers coach at Alabama (2009-11), where he tutored both Mosley and Upshaw.

• Ravens **T Rick Wagner** and Saints **WR Nick Toon** were staples in Wisconsin's offense from 2008-11. The 2011 season was also Ravens RBs coach **Thomas Hammock**'s first season with the Badgers.

• Ravens **K Justin Tucker** played with Saints **S Kenny Vaccaro** at Texas from 2009-10. In 2010, the Longhorns were crowned Big 12 Champions and advanced to the BCS title game.

• Ravens **WR/RS Jacoby Jones** is from New Orleans and went to St. Augustine HS, before transferring to Marion Abramson HS his junior year. Jones and Saints **WR Robert Meachem** annually host a football camp together each spring in New Orleans.

• Saints **T Tavon Rooks** (practice squad) was born in Baltimore and attended Woodlawn (Randallstown) HS, just 10 minutes away from the Ravens' training facility in Owings Mills.

• Saints **WR Brandon Coleman** (practice squad) prepped at Bishop McNamara (Forestville, MD) HS.

• Ravens **K Justin Tucker** and Saints **QB Drew Brees** are both graduates of Westlake (TX) HS, and each competed in the Texas 5A State Championship game. Brees claimed the lone title between the two following a perfect 16-0 season as a senior (1996).

LAST GAME VS. NEW ORLEANS: RAVENS 30, SAINTS 24 (12/19/10)

The Ravens jumped out to a 21-7, second-quarter lead and held off the defending Super Bowl champion Saints in the fourth quarter to win, 30-24, at M&T Bank Stadium. New Orleans, held to 269 yards, rallied to tie the game at 24 with 11:34 left in the final period. But, the Ravens responded with 2 K Billy Cundiff field goals (32 and 27 yards) while holding QB Drew Brees and the Saints' offense scoreless on their final two possessions. RB Ray Rice, who produced his most scrimmage yards (233) in a game in his threeyear career, scored 2 of the Ravens' first 3 TDs (10-yard run and 17-yard pass from QB Joe Flacco). Rice rushed 31 times for 153 yards and caught 5 for 80 more. Flacco, who also threw a 34-yard TD pass to rookie TE Ed Dickson (his first-career TD catch) in the first quarter, completed 10 of 20 for 172 yards. DE Cory Redding intercepted Brees' final pass of the game on a ball tipped by DT Haloti Ngata. Brees completed 29 of 46 passes for 267 yards with 3 TDs, while the Saints were held to just 27 rushing yards on 14 attempts. The 27 rushing yards allowed were the fifthlowest by an opponent in Ravens history. With the victory, the Ravens have won 15 of 16 games against the NFC in Baltimore, including nine straight. The team also improved to 20-2 when rushing for at least 125 yards in the John Harbaugh Era (2008-10).

Week 11 Recap: New Orleans dropped its second-straight game at home by losing to Cincinnati, 27-10, last Sunday. QB Drew Brees connected on 33 of 41 passing attempts (80.5%) for 255 yards and 1 TD. Nine different Saints receivers caught a pass in the contest, including **WR** Marques Colston, who led the team with 56 yards on 4 receptions.


Sean Payton: Since Payton's 2006 arrival, the Saints have claimed five playoff appearances, three NFC South titles, two NFC Championship berths and the Super Bowl XLIV title. Payton, who owns an 83-49 career record (.629), has led New Orleans to Top 10 offensive rankings in each of his eight seasons, including finishing No. 1 in the NFL in 2011 (with a league-record 7,474 yards), 2009, 2008 and 2006.

Offense: New Orleans owns the NFL's second-ranked offense (424.5 ypg), placing third and eighth in passing (299.8) and rushing (124.7), respectively. **QB Drew Brees** leads the league in completion percentage (69.5%), totaling the NFL's fourth-highest passing yards (3,071). **TE Jimmy Graham** leads the team with 623 yards and 7 TDs receiving, while **RB Mark Ingram** paces the run game with 618 yards and a career-best 6 TDs.

Defense: The Saints are 20th in total defense, allowing 369.9 yards per game. LB Curtis Lofton leads New Orleans' unit with 93 tackles, which rank sixth in the NFL. LB Junior Galette (6) and DE Cameron Jordan (5) have combined for 11 sacks this year, accounting for half of the team's

RAVENS' TWO-STRAIGHT TOP 5'S

In 2013, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of The Dallas Morning News ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 5 in the league in his annual comprehensive ratings system that is based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing -1 for best, 32 for worst. In 2012, Gosselin ranked the Ravens' unit No. 2 in the NFL, just behind the Vikings, who finished first.

SPECIAL FORCES



Special teams coordinator/associate head coach Jerry Rosburg, a 36-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008.

• Dating back to 2011, Baltimore has 7 total kick return TDs (3 PR & 4 KOR), ranking as the NFL's most.

• In 2012's Super Bowl season, the Ravens' ST units excelled. Led by Pro Bowl RS Jacoby Jones, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.3), also setting a team record. Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR) and averaged an NFL-best 30.7 yards per kickoff return. Jones also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in Super Bowl history with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's Week 9 game at Pittsburgh, Jones added another 108-yard KOR-TD to his stellar resume and now has 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards during his career.)

• In 2013, Pro Bowl K Justin Tucker set franchise records in FGs made (38) and FGs attempted (41). Going 38-of-41 on FGAs, Tucker produced a franchise-record 140 points (tied for sixth in NFL), while his 6 FGs of 50+ yards tied (several players) for the NFL's most. Tucker kicked an impressive 3 game-winning FGs on the season, including a 61-yarder at Detroit.

• Additionally, in 2013, the Ravens' KOR unit averaged 26.4 vards per return, ranking second in the NFL. Baltimore's punt return unit averaged 14.2 yards per return, the NFL's third-best mark. The Ravens posted an NFL-high 20 punt returns of 20+ yards.

• Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume with both the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Under his leadership, Cleveland's special teams units were consistently ranked among the NFL's best. Over a five-year span (2002-06), the Browns' special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive special teams report.

• Four Ravens players have earned Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST Brendon Ayanbadejo (2008), K Billy Cundiff (2010), RS Jacoby Jones (2012) and K Justin Tucker (2013).

A STRONG RETURN

Dating back to 2008 when Jerry Rosburg became the Ravens' special teams coordinator, Baltimore has produced the NFL's No. 1 kickoff return average (25.4) and second-most (tied) KOR-TDs (6).

COORDINATORS NOTES

THE KUBIAK ATTACK



Gary Kubiak, a 21-year NFL coaching veteran who spent the past eight seasons (2006-13) as head coach of the Houston Texans, was hired as the Ravens' offensive coordinator on Jan. 27. Under his guidance, Houston earned back-to-back AFC South crowns from 2011-12 and two playoff berths.

Kubiak owns a Texans' franchise-record 63 total wins, posting a 63-66 overall mark (61-64 regular season, 2-2 postseason). Prior to his time with the Texans, Kubiak spent 11 seasons (1995-2005) as the Denver Broncos' offensive coordinator, also coaching the quarterbacks during his first eight seasons. Under his guidance, Denver's offense reached new heights behind the likes of QB John Elway, TE Shannon Sharpe and RB Terrell Davis, with the team earning seven postseason trips and back-to-back Super Bowl titles (1997-98) during that span. As Denver's offensive coordinator, the Broncos averaged NFL bests in yards per game (365.0) and points per game (25.2) from 1995-2005.

TEXANS SUCCESS

Under **Gary Kubiak**, the Texans earned their Top 6 all-time offensive outputs in scoring, total offense and passing yards from 2007-12. During this time, the Texans also boasted the franchise's Top 3 rushing outputs, including the NFL's No. 2 ground attack in 2011 when they posted a franchise-record 153.0 yards per game. From 2008-12, Kubiak's offense was one of only two teams (Denver) to have its total offense, passing offense and rushing offense each rank in the Top 5 at least once during that span.

Dean Pees, an 11-year NFL-coaching veteran, was promoted to defensive coordinator on Jan. 27, 2012, after guiding the Ravens' LBs for two seasons. He is the sixth "D" coordinator in franchise history. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, leads a Baltimore unit that in 2014

has allowed the NFL's fifth-fewest points per game (18.1) and boasts the league's No. 5 red zone defense (46.9 TD success rate by opponents).

SMITH WAS SCINTILLATING

WR Torrey Smith excelled in 2013. With 6 receptions for 121 yards in Week 5 at Miami, Smith became the first Raven since Qadry Ismail in 1999 to post back-to-back 100-yard receiving games. (Ismail had three straight that year.)

• In Week 15 at Detroit, Smith (now 42) moved past Derrick Mason (35) to produce a franchise record in receptions of 25-or-more yards.

• Smith had 13 catches gaining 25-plus yards in 2013, just 1 shy of the franchise single-season record set by WR Michael Jackson (14) in 1996.

• Smith's 1,128 receiving yards in 2013 were the second most in Ravens single-season franchise history (Jackson – 1,201 in 1996).

• Smith, who produced a 17.4-yard receiving average in 2013, pulled in a 42-yard bomb in Week 16 vs. NE, marking his eighth catch of 40-or-more yards in 2013.

Head Coach John Harbaugh on Torrey Smith: "In my opinion, he's a premier player in the National Football League. ... He works his rear end off. He has a great attitude. You have to pull the guy back. You have to grab him and say, 'Hey, man. Take a blow!' You have to do that, because he's like a horse - he'll run himself until his heart explodes. He'll do it. He's just a great, great young man."

TORREY'S COURAGEOUS NIGHT

WR Torrey Smith played in the 2012 Week 3 Sunday night victory over New England after his brother, 19-year-old Tevin Jones, passed away in a motorcycle accident that morning. Smith posted 6 catches for 127 yards and 2 TDs in the come-from-behind win, producing the third 100-yard game of his young career.

SMITH BIG IN SUPER BOWL RUN

In the 2012 thrilling, double-overtime Divisional Playoff win at Denver (38-35 on 1/12/13), WR Torrey Smith caught 59-yard and 32-yard TD passes, helping mark the first game in NFL playoff history that a QB (Joe Flacco) threw 2 TDs of 59-plus yards (the other being to WR Jacoby Jones on a 70-yarder). In the 2012 postseason, Smith recorded a 21.2 yards-per-catch average, reeling in 11 passes for 233 yards.

LONG BALL LOVE

No doubt, WR Torrey Smith is a big-play threat. The fourth-year wideout has 25 career TD catches (including a team-high 6 in 2014). Those career scoring strikes have gained 599 yards for an average of 23.96 vards per touchdown. Here is a breakdown of Smith's career touchdowns:

CB Jimmy Smith, one of the NFL's top cornerbacks and the Ravens' 2011 first-round pick, suffered a foot injury in Week 8 at Cincy and has been placed on Injured Reserve for the rest of the season. Even though he missed the past two games, Smith is still first on the team with 8 PD, also racking up 28 tackles.

• In Week 6's 48-17 win at Tampa Bay, Smith had 5 tackles and 1 INT, which he returned 31 yards to help set up a Ravens' TD.

• Smith has been outstanding over the past couple seasons. In 2013, he had 16 passes defensed (third on the team), adding 2 INTs, 2 FFs and 58 tackles in his first year as a regular starter for the club.

TANGLED IN THE WEBB



Ravens **CB/RS Lardarius Webb** led the Ravens with 22 passes defensed in 2013, a total that ranked second in the NFL (Tennessee's Alterraun Verner had 23). Webb, who missed most of the 2012 campaign with a torn ACL, returned to action in 2013 and helped guide a Ravens' secondary that

allowed just 56.9 percent of opponent passes to be completed. In 2014, Webb has 6 PD for the Ravens, fourth most on the team.

One of the NFL's most disruptive forces, **DT Haloti Ngata** was named to his fifth Pro Bowl in 2013. Perhaps the NFL's most athletic defensive tackle, Ngata stops the run (525 career tackles), rushes the passer (25.5 career sacks) and can even drop into coverage (an impressive 5 career INTs).

Baltimore has a history of strong run defense, and with Ngata's help since 2006, has been consistently sturdy on the ground.

Tucker had a franchiserecord 140 points (tied for sixth in NFL), while his 6 FGs of 50+ yards tied (several players) for the NFL's most.

• In addition to his 2013 Pro Bowl honor, Tucker was named Special Teams Player of the Month (November) and AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times.

• Tucker made 33-straight FGs at one point during the 2013 season, ranking as the NFL's fourth-longest streak of all time.

• His 6 FGs made on 12/16 at Det. set a team record and were a singlegame NFL high in 2013. Against the Lions, he became the first NFL kicker ever to connect from the 20-, 30-, 40-, 50- & 60-yard range in a game.

• Tucker kicked 3 game-winning FGs in 2013, including a franchiserecord 61-yarder at Detroit. (He now has 7-career game-winners.)

JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE

Opening statement: "OK, good seeing everybody – really missed you guys. *(laughter)* It's great to see you. It is, actually, it's good. You guys happy to be back? Players were back today; coaches were back today. We had the coaches out Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday after we did our work Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. The players were out after they worked on Monday. It's good to have everybody back. We got a good workout in today. Guys are feeling reenergized, so it was a good, positive day. It's like coming back to school – everybody was happy and excited to be back. They were excited about the workout. The players took some time off. We got away and emotionally recharged a little bit, but also physically recharged. I'm not sure you realize ... You don't realize how exhausted you are until you get a chance to take a deep breath and relax. The next thing you know, you're like, 'Wow, this has really been helpful.' So everybody gets a bye week. We had ours this week, and we hope to make the most of it going forward for the rest of the season."

Obviously, the purpose of the bye week is to relax and recharge and get everybody reenergized, but the fact that this year the bye week was the latest you've had since you were here, did it feel more like a relief when you finally got your time off than maybe a standard October bye? (*Joe Platania*) "We had more weeks under our belt, so hopefully, maybe it did feel more needed at that point. Our guys did a good job of pushing through. I thought we played hard and well right through to the end – which is what we asked our guys to do – which is challenging when you have a bye this late, and they responded. They responded over the course of the week by taking care of themselves and doing the things they need to do to be professionals and not be concerned about the other things, but be concerned about getting themselves right for the stretch run. So, I was happy with that."

John, Titans TE Chase Coffman, it looked like it was an intentional act where he takes out your assistant coach, Tony Coaxum. They fined him \$30,000 – did not suspend him. What was your take on the league's response, and what happened there with that incident? (*Aaron Wilson*) "It's really difficult to have a response to the level of punishment. I know the league, they have protocols, and they have standards and histories and things like that they look really hard at. We don't ever really question that part of it. That's in their purview. I was told it wasn't intentional, so I'll take them at their word on that, and we move forward."

John, you had Tennessee coming out of a bye, and that week you said they should be favored because they're the team coming out of the bye. Sometimes, though, coming out of a bye you're sort of flat – the Redskins yesterday for example. How do you prevent that, and how could you explain how a team could come out so flat after a bye? (Dave Ginsburg) "That's a good question. It's a challenge. I'm not sure of the dynamics in every different situation, but boy, we better not get into that situation. We're going to have a tough environment. We're playing on Monday Night Football. We're playing in New Orleans. They're coming off two loses. They're a very proud team, very well-coached, very talented – great quarterback, aggressive defense, one of the most aggressive defensive coaches in football and one of the most aggressive offensive coaches in football in Sean [Payton] and Rob [Ryan]. We're going to have our hands full, and we better be ready to go. I like to believe that our guys understand that, but we'll find out Monday night. I believe they do understand that."

What kind of challenges does QB Drew Brees pose for the defense? (*Todd Karpovich*) "[Drew Brees is] very unique as a quarterback. He's one of a kind. He's the classic West Coast operator. You think of the guys in that offense – Joe Montanatype guys that didn't have the size, but got the ball out quick, made the reads quickly, quick decisions. He's really uncanny in the pocket. He has an uncanny ability to keep a play alive in the pocket, or outside of the pocket and find someone to throw to, or just get rid of it. He takes very few sacks. He holds the ball, but he takes very few sacks. That's a gift. [He is] one of the all-time great statistic quarterbacks in the history of the game. [It is] going to be a big challenge for us."

John, does it help in the preparation process when a team you know so well is the team that [New Orleans] played most recently? Knowing that it was the Bengals, knowing that you know what they do, does that help in sort of preparation for the Saints? (*Jeff Zrebiec*) "That's a good question. There is probably some familiarity there. We know what we're looking at on the one side of the ball probably. It's good to compare a little bit, because you've seen that. That's one of the advantages of the cross-division games. We see a lot of those games against teams in our division when we play outside of our division."



John, maybe it's my imagination, but it seems this season there has been a wider range of performance. You see a situation like the Bengals where they have a game where they look just terrible, next game they look terrific, and a lot of teams with tough records putting up big, somewhat surprising performances. No. 1, do you see that, too? And if you do, does that make it harder to prepare week to week if there's this range of performance? (*Peter Schmuck*) "That's a great question. I tend to think that it has been that way pretty much every year, maybe we just kind of forget. I don't know. It would be really interesting to go back and look at that and see if it's different. I have a little bit of a theory on the big scores. In some ways, maybe the rules are swung a little bit toward the offense and made it more challenging. And the offensive skill players are so good that if you get a guy or two hurt on defense, you're really at a disadvantage. Maybe that leads to some of the scores, but some of these guys are just playing at a really high level as well. And then teams come back the very next week and win and win by a lot. It'd be a great study. It'd be interesting."

Quick follow up: Is there any possibility that the expanded Thursday schedule has an impact on momentum week to week in the NFL? (*Peter Schmuck*) "I don't know. I'm sure it's a possibility. I'm sure it's something that they'll probably look at. They study that stuff pretty hard, but I don't know."

John, when you have a bye, do you look at your team solely and then find out, "OK, now," internally what you do better, or do you really prepare for the teams that you're going to be facing? Is it more of a look ahead, or maybe an introspective type of thing? (*Dave Ginsburg*) "We did both. We looked at our opponents and just tried to study the challenges that we're going to be facing – most specifically New Orleans, but also who is ahead. But as much as that, or even maybe more than that, we looked at ourselves. We did crosschecks and things like that, all the things that we normally do in a bye week to try to understand how we've been calling games and how we've been trying to attack people, and what's been good and what hasn't been good, and what guys do well and what they don't do as well, and try to be our best down the stretch."

John, when [Ravens offensive coordinator] Gary Kubiak spoke to us the middle of last week, he was talking about the last three or four weeks how the offense hasn't played to a level that he thinks it is capable of. What areas would you really like to see get cleaned up, and what do you think is sort of the cause – I don't want to say struggles – but some of the numbers that aren't as good as it was earlier in the season? (*Jeff Zrebiec*) "The big-picture stuff – I do believe Gary hit on this – but the turnovers is where it starts. We were better at that this last week. You have to be aggressive and you have to make plays at the same time. You can't turn the ball over. You have to find a balance where the big plays out-shadow the turnovers by a wide margin. Third down has been important for us. You go back two weeks ago, if we convert on third down, we're a whole different offense up there in Pittsburgh, so that would've been big for us. And that's something over the last few weeks that has not always gone our way. Scoring touchdowns in the red zone, we've been up and down on that. When we do that, we're pretty effective. And making big plays. Big plays are an area that ... We have a lot of playmakers. We have really good playmakers pretty much at every position, and those guys want to make as many plays as they can. That, oftentimes, is the difference."

John, did you get a chance to see what [Patriots RB] Jonas Gray did last night (199 yards, 4 TDs)? And when a player does that, whether it's here in Baltimore or they move on elsewhere, is that a selling point for your practice squad guys to continue to put in that effort every week? (*Luke Jones*) "Yes, that was great to see. Jonas, he was here [in 2013]. We became pretty tight, actually, because he's from Detroit, and his mom brought some food over when we played the Lions last year on Monday Night Football. She was great. Some Gold Star Chili ... It might not have been Gold Star, but it was chili dogs from Greek Town. Cheese, onions, beans – the whole nine – so I'll always appreciate that. (*laughter*) But we were disappointed to lose Jonas last year when we lost him. We really thought he had a lot of upside. He felt like that was an opportunity that he wanted to pursue, and obviously, it's paid off for him. So, I wish him nothing but the best, but I was happy for him last night to see him do that. That was great to see."

Maryland-Michigan, who do you got? (*Joe Platania*) "Maryland-Michigan? (*laughter*) Woo! May the best team win. How's that?" (*laughter*)
