## SEATTLE (7-5) VS. BALTIMORE (4-8)

SUNDAY, DEC. 13, 2015 • 1 P.M. ET • M&T BANK STADIUM (71,008)



### JUST THE FACTS

- An injury-riddled, nail-biting, down-to-the-wire, in-every-game season continues for the Baltimore Ravens (4-8) when they host the Seattle Seahawks (7-5) on Sunday, Dec. 13. Kickoff for this M&T Bank Stadium battle is set for 1 p.m., after the contest was “flexed out” of its original 8:30 p.m. primetime slot. The Seahawks have won three-straight games, while Baltimore has captured victories in two of its last three.
- Last Sunday at Miami, the Ravens dropped a 15-13 decision, marking the fifth game Baltimore has lost by 4 points or fewer this season. Baltimore’s best opportunity to win came when **S Kendrick Lewis** forced a fumble, which was recovered by **OLB Courtney Upshaw**, at the Miami 41 with 4:17 left in the fourth quarter. After the Ravens’ offense gained just four yards on the ensuing three plays, **K Justin Tucker**’s 55-yard FG attempt went wide right. Baltimore did get the ball back with 20 seconds remaining, but was unable to move into scoring position. The Ravens lost, despite outgaining Miami, 375 to 219 yards, with **QB Matt Schaub** throwing for 308 yards and 1 TD, but also tossing 2 INTs (including a costly pick-6). Rookie **RB Javorius Allen**, who accounted for 170 yards from scrimmage, posted 12 receptions for 107 yards, adding 63 yards on 17 rushes.
- All 12 Ravens games have been decided by no more than 8 points this season, making Baltimore the first team in NFL history to have each of its first nine, 10, 11 and 12 games decided by 8-or-fewer points.
- In all eight defeats this season, the Ravens have had an opportunity to tie the game or take a lead in the final two minutes of play, or, like in Week 10 vs. Jacksonville, they led with a second to go but lost when time expired. (The NFL later admitted that Baltimore should have won the game, acknowledging an officiating mistake on the final play from scrimmage.)
- Five of Baltimore’s first seven games this season were on the road, with the Ravens dropping close contests at Denver, at Oakland, at San Francisco and at Arizona. The last time an NFL team opened the season playing five of its first seven games on the road was in 2000. That team – 16 years ago – was the eventual Super Bowl XXXV-winning Ravens.

Baltimore’s eight losses have been decided by 34 total points, producing the NFL’s second-slimmest average margin of defeat at 4.25 points. Seattle has also been in many close games this season, with its 5.40 margin of defeat (in five losses) ranking fourth in the league.

- The Ravens have 16 players on Injured Reserve, including Flacco, Forsett, Smith Sr., Suggs, Zuttah, **WR/RS Michael Campanaro** (back), **CB Will Davis** (knee), first-round draft choice **WR Breshad Perriman** (knee), who was injured on the first day of training camp, and **RB Lorenzo Taliaferro** (foot). Former starter **TE Dennis Pitta** (hip) is on the Physically Unable to Perform (PUP) list and will not return this year.

## NOTE OF THE WEEK I

**RB Javorius "Buck" Allen** produced 170 yards from scrimmage last Sunday at Miami, pulling in 12 catches for 107 yards and rushing 17 times for 63 yards. Here are some fast facts about the rookie's standout performance:

- ✓ Since 2011, only six players have posted at least 60 rushing yards and 100 receiving yards in a game: Allen, Le'Veon Bell (2014), Reggie Bush (2013), Matt Forte (2014), Arian Foster (three times in 2011) and Jeremy Langford (2015).
- ✓ Allen is the 14th player over the past 10 seasons to post at least 60 rushing yards, 100 receiving yards and 1 receiving TD in a game.
- ✓ Allen is just the second player in Ravens history to have 60 rushing yards and 100 receiving yards in a game, joining Ray Rice (77 and 117 on 10/18/09 at Min.)
- ✓ With his Sunday output, Allen produced the 25th game in Ravens history of a player gaining at least 170 yards from scrimmage.
- ✓ Allen's 12 catches rank as the third most in Ravens single-game history. Priest Holmes (10/11/98) and Steve Smith Sr. (9/27/15) each tallied 13.
- ✓ Allen's 107 receiving yards are the third most by a RB in Ravens single-game history (Ray Rice had 117 on 10/18/09 at Min. and Jamal Lewis had 108 vs. NO on 12/8/02).
- ✓ Allen's 12 catches are the most by an NFL RB this season (Danny Woodhead is next with 11), while his 107 receiving yards rank fifth.

## SPOTLIGHT: JAVORIUS "BUCK" ALLEN

**Justin Forsett compared you to Arian Foster. Do you model your game after a specific player?** "I had a couple people tell me Arian Foster. At the Combine, someone asked me, and I said Marshawn Lynch. He just won't be stopped, and that's the mentality I want to have. I just can't be stopped and want to fight for every inch. My game is like Arian. He can catch, run well and has great vision, but my mentality is like Marshawn."

**You delivered a commencement speech at USC's student-athlete graduation. Describe that.** "I was the first one in my family to go to college, and everybody said I had to pick the farthest place to go. It was something I knew I had to leave home and do, and my grandma always told me, 'You've got to take care of yourself before you can take care of somebody else.' So, I figured I'd go out there and take care of myself, do what I needed to get done, and then hopefully I'd have a chance to take care of my family, which God has now put me in a position to do. It was great going out there, but it was tough, because nobody really told me what college was going to be like. My adviser asked me at the end of the season what I thought about speaking at graduation, and I was like, 'I'm not doing it.' I don't really talk much. I don't really talk unless spoken to, and they kept asking me. My adviser said, 'I really think you should do it. People would love it. Your story is very touching.' I finally gave in."

**Which was a better feeling, graduating college or being drafted?** "College, because that piece of paper stays with you forever. Everybody wants to make it to the NFL, but only a handful will, which I was part of the handful that did. God blessed me to do it, but more importantly, that paper, that's something that nobody can take away from you. This game of football, somebody can take that away from you; it can be gone on any play. So, I would say graduating college was the better feeling."

**What was your first job?** "Tending pigs when I got out of school. The dude that lived next to us, he probably had over 40 pigs. We would take the big black trash cans with the wheels – they were big, because I remember getting up on my tiptoes trying to scoop the slop out of it. If you're not working there or you're not around that, it stinks so bad, but at the age of 7 or 8, to have like \$80 of your own money in your pocket at the end of the week, it just felt amazing."

**Who was your favorite athlete growing up?** "This is only because my Pop Warner team was the Steelers, the Miccosukee Steelers. At the time we picked them, we didn't know they were good; we just liked the gold and black. We picked from three teams, and we ended up going with the Steelers. Watching the Steelers, I grew up liking Jerome Bettis."

# QUOTH THE RAVENS

FOOTBALL

“We are going to continue to fight no matter what. I feel like we have good leadership – a good group of guys – where we are going to keep fighting no matter what. We have the right guys to turn this around. We are going to fight every day. That is just the way that it is going to be. ... We have to understand that we’re in a hole. We need to attack it and climb our way out. That starts every day with doing the little stuff right – practicing our tails off, lifting weights, paying attention in meetings. All those little things make the difference in the end.”

**- G Marshal Yanda on how the team will continue to fight**

**Special teams coordinator/associate head coach Jerry Rosburg on why the Ravens have such a standout special teams unit:**

“The *team*. It’s about the team. We’re all about winning. We want to be great on special teams, but we want to be great so we can win games. That’s the whole idea behind it. Our players buy into the fact that if you really get good at something on offense and defense, and you can help us on special teams, our team is better. Or if you’re a backup on offense and defense – and you’re not yet ready to start there – and you can get good at a lot of things on special teams, it makes our team better. It’s really built on the concept of *team*.”

**The Baltimore Sun’s Jon Meoli on the discipline and talent of Baltimore’s special teams unit:**

“They aren’t on the field for as many plays as the offense or defense, but this unit is so disciplined that they seldom make mistakes. They trust the scheme enough to get the job done, and have been rotating players through spots all season and still get the same results. The specialists, Justin Tucker and Sam Koch, get all the credit, and rightfully so, but this is a group-wide effort.”

**John Harbaugh on DT Timmy Jernigan developing into a dominant player for the Ravens:**

“Timmy is explosive. He’s powerful. He’s a good mix of power and explosion. Every week he’s playing a little harder. He’s really starting to get a feel for turning that motor up a notch every single week, and I think he can keep doing it. I think he has a couple more notches in him, as far as his energy level, because he’s talented.”

**Rookie RB Javorius Allen on reserve players stepping up for injured starters, like RB Justin Forsett:**

“[Running backs] coach [Thomas] Hammock, he believes in us. He believes in the guys he has in the room; that’s why we’re in that room. So, I don’t think he ever panicked or was like, ‘What are we going to do?’ He prepared me for this moment during OTAs and during camp, and I knew my time was going to come. When it comes, I’ve just got to take full advantage of it and be ready.”

**John Harbaugh on RB Javorius Allen’s development this season:**

“I think ‘Buck’ [Javorius Allen] has come a long way. Where would we be without him right now? That’s one thing to look at. There’s a fourth-round pick rookie who has come in and done a good job, and I really do have high hopes for him. I really do believe he can be a *really* good running back in this league. He has really good vision. He’s fluid. He can make a tight cut. ... He’s tough. He’s willing. He’s smart enough, and he has to keep working on that part of it, too.”

**John Harbaugh on his team’s high character:**

“We have character guys. We have a great locker room. We have tremendous coaches. I’ve always felt like the mental to the physical – my dad has always said – is like three is to one. Attitude is really everything, and it starts with the position coaches in their room. And if the position coaches in their room do a good job of letting those guys understand that, really, what it’s about is how we handle this, how we play. It’s not about pointing a finger; it’s about having somebody’s back. It’s not about the outcome; it’s about the process. It’s about taking care of one another. It’s about coming through adversity and doing the right things.”

**BaltimoreRavens.com columnist John Eisenberg on the Ravens:**

“You would think the Ravens would have a better record, but of course, they’ve experienced major problems of their own, leaving them in the running for a high draft pick rather than a playoff spot. They also have faced playoff-caliber teams such as the Arizona Cardinals, Cincinnati Bengals and Denver Broncos, all current division leaders. Strangely, the caliber of the opposition hasn’t seemed to matter, for no matter who the Ravens play, the game comes down to the final seconds and turns on some extreme football weirdness.”

**QB Matt Schaub on his confidence in WR Kamar Aiken and Aiken’s growth from a practice squad player to a No. 1 receiver:**

“It definitely shows that all the hard work pays off. All these years, he has just kept coming to practice, kept coming to work and just continuing to strive to do the best that he can and be perfect on his routes and understand what the quarterback is thinking, coverages and his subtle route adjustment. Kamar does run crisp routes, and he doesn’t confuse the quarterback with his breaks, and he has shown the ability to have strong hands and go attack the football and not wait on the football. You’ve got to love that as quarterback.”

**Dolphins head coach Dan Campbell on how much respect he has for Baltimore’s O-line given the injuries it has had this season:**

“To me, that’s one of the strengths of that offense, if not *the* strength right now. They show up, and their aggression shows up. Their physicality shows up. They’ve got a number of good players. [Marshal] Yanda shows up to me; I think he’s a hell of a player. Just the way he gets after it in the run game and pass protection. They’re a physical unit. I’ve said this before, you don’t have to have the most talented offensive line to be good up front, and they’re a crew that seems to work together well and they play physical.”

## SUCCESS VS. THE NFC

The Ravens have won seven of their past nine games vs. NFC foes. Under head coach **John Harbaugh**, Baltimore is 20-11 in games vs. the "other" conference since his 2008 head-coaching arrival.

## LAST GAME: MIA. 15, BAL. 13

For an NFL-record 12th time in 12 games, the outcome of the Ravens' game was in doubt during the final series of the contest. This time the Ravens dropped a 15-13 game to the Dolphins at Sun Life Stadium. The loss stopped a two-game winning streak for Baltimore, which battled valiantly with a roster depleted by injuries. The difference in the game came in a 20-second period in the final 2 minutes of the first half when Miami turned 2 **QB Matt Schaub** INTs into 15 points. With 1:54 remaining in the second quarter, DT Jordan Phillips tipped a Schaub pass that was intercepted by S Reshad Jones at the Ravens' 38-yard line. On the next play, QB Ryan Tannehill hit leaping rookie WR DeVante Parker for a TD. Three plays later, Schaub's pass was batted in the air by DE Derrick Shelby, who grabbed the deflection and raced 22 yards for the TD. A 2-point conversion (RB Jay Ajayi) gave the Dolphins a 15-0 advantage. The Ravens did respond with a 7-play drive that ended with a 38-yard **K Justin Tucker** FG, making the score 15-3 at the half. The Ravens missed two opportunities to score earlier in the game. The first came in the initial quarter when Schaub hit **WR Daniel Brown** with a 52-yard TD throw that was nullified on a disputed offensive pass interference call on Brown. On the next series (in the second quarter), Schaub directed a 15-play, 75-yard drive that stalled on a failed fourth-down conversion at the Dolphins' 2-yard line. Baltimore lost, despite outgaining Miami 375 to 219 yards, with Schaub throwing for 308 yards (32 of 46). Dolphins RB Lamar Miller rushed for 113 yards (on 20 carries), while Tannehill was held to 9-of-19 for 86 yards. **RB Javorius "Buck" Allen**, who accounted for 170 yards, brought the Ravens within 5 points (15-10) in the third quarter when he scampered 41 yards to the end zone on a short Schaub pass. (Allen came within one catch of tying the Ravens' record of 13 catches in a game, grabbing 12 for 107 yards. He added 63 yards on 17 rushes.) A 31-yard Tucker FG made the score 15-13 with 10:17 left in the contest. The Ravens' best opportunity to win came after Miller fumbled at the Miami 41 with 4:17 left in the final quarter. **S Kendrick Lewis** forced the turnover that was recovered by **OLB Courtney Upshaw**. After gaining just 4 yards in three plays, Tucker's FG attempt from 55 yards was wide right. Baltimore did get the ball back with 20 seconds remaining.

# LAST GAME VS. SEATTLE

## 2011: SEAHAWKS 22, RAVENS 17

Seahawks 22, Ravens 17 • Nov. 13, 2011 • Seattle, WA

For the third time during the 2011 season, the Ravens lost on the road to a team entering the game with a losing record, dropping a 22-17 decision at Seattle. Baltimore fell behind 10-0 in the first quarter after Seattle RB Marshawn Lynch scored on a 1-yard run. K Steve Hauschka hit the first of his 5 field goals (22, 38, 39, 35 and 30) after WR/RS David Reed fumbled a kickoff return at the Ravens' 19. Baltimore came within 3 after a RB Ray Rice 1-yard TD pass to TE Ed Dickson. Hauschka added 3 more FGs in the second quarter, the last coming after Reed fumbled another KOR at the Ravens' 18. Seattle increased a 19-7 halftime lead to 22-7 early in the third quarter on Hauschka's 5th FG, which was set up by LB David Hawthorne's interception of **QB Joe Flacco**. Hawthorne took the theft to the Ravens' 8-yard line. Ravens K Billy Cundiff narrowed the margin to 22-10 with a 35-yard FG in the third quarter. Flacco threw an 11-yard TD dart to Dickson with 5:52 left in the game to bring Baltimore within 5 (22-17). But the Seahawks then kept the ball the remainder of the game. Lynch finished with 109 yards rushing, adding 58 more on 5 catches. Flacco threw a careerhigh 52 passes, completing 29 for 255 yards, including 10 (79 yards) to Dickson (the most catches in a game by a Ravens' tight end). The loss to Seattle was one of only four defeats for Baltimore on the season, as the team went 12-4 and advanced to the AFC Championship at New England.

Allowing the Giants a meager 152 total net yards, New York's attack crossed midfield just twice, while Baltimore's "D" posted 4 INTs. LB Ray Lewis was named the game's MVP, capping an accolade-filled season in which he was also tabbed the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year.



**QB Joe Flacco - 2012  
Super Bowl XLVII MVP**

Baltimore defeated San Francisco, 34-31, in Super Bowl XLVII, capturing the franchise's second World Championship. After an amazing first-half performance, the Ravens took a commanding 28-6 lead. But following a bizarre, 34-minute power outage that halted play, the 49ers stormed back into contention. Clinging to a 34-29 edge late in the game, the Ravens stood firm on a pivotal goal-line stand, jamming SF on four-straight plays inside the 7-yard line. QB Joe Flacco was named the game's MVP.

## COACH HARBS



**John Harbaugh** has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in six (2008-12 and 2014) of his seven full seasons in Baltimore, and in 2012, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl championship. Under his guidance, the Ravens have secured an appearance in three AFC Championships (2008, 2011 & 2012).

## THREE-STRAIGHT TOP 3s

In 2014, senior NFL writer Rick Gosselin of *The Dallas Morning News* ranked the Ravens' special teams unit No. 5 in the league in his annual comprehensive ratings system that is based on 22 categories, assigning points according to each standing — 1 for best, 32 for worst. In 2013, Gosselin also ranked the Ravens' unit No. 5, and in 2012, he awarded them the No. 2 spot (behind Minnesota).

## RAVENS THRIVE W/ ROSBURG



Special teams coordinator/associate head coach **Jerry Rosburg**, a 36-year coaching veteran, has guided a strong special teams group since arriving in Baltimore in 2008.

- In 2014, **P Sam Koch** produced the NFL's No. 3 gross average (47.4) and No. 1 net average (43.3), setting the Ravens' single-season records for each. This season, in another stellar campaign, Koch's 48.3 gross average ranks No. 4 in the NFL, while his 44.5 net average is No. 1.

- Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker**, who Rosburg scouted and helped sign as a rookie free agent, owns the NFL's second-most FGs (123) since entering the league in 2012. "Tuck" has connected on 123 of 141 FGAs to post an 87.2 success rate, the third-best mark in league history. In his 60th game on Dec. 6, 2015, Tucker became the fastest kicker in NFL history to reach 500 points, surpassing Hall of Famer Jan Stenerud (61 games).

- In 2012's Super Bowl season, the Ravens' ST units excelled. Led by Pro Bowl RS Jacoby Jones, Baltimore ranked first in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.3), also setting a team record. Jones, who became the first player ever to record dual KORs of at least 105 yards in a career, tied for a league-leading 3 kick return TDs (2 KORs & 1 PR) and averaged an NFL-best 30.7 yards per kickoff return. Jones also tied an NFL record for longest KOR in Super Bowl history with his 108-yard KOR-TD. (In 2014's Week 9 game at Pittsburgh, Jones added another 108-yard KOR-TD to his stellar resume, marking 4 total KOR-TDs over 100 yards during his career.)

- Impressively, Baltimore has ranked in the NFL's Top 5 in KOR average four times over the past seven seasons.

- Prior to Baltimore, Rosburg built a successful NFL special teams resume with the Browns (2001-06) and Falcons (2007). Over a five-year span (2002-06), Cleveland's special teams were ranked as the top NFL unit in Rick Gosselin's annual comprehensive report.

- Four Ravens players have earned Pro Bowl honors while playing for Rosburg: ST **Brendon Ayanbadejo** (2008), **K Billy Cundiff** (2010), RS **Jacoby Jones** (2012) and **K Justin Tucker** (2013).

- In Games 7 through 11 this season, the Ravens blocked a kick (2 PATs, 2 FGs and 1 punt) in five-straight contests, a feat that hasn't been accomplished since 1983 (Atlanta Falcons).

## A STRONG RETURN

Since 2008, when **Jerry Rosburg** became the Ravens' special teams coordinator, Baltimore owns the NFL's No. 1 KOR average (25.4).

# COORDINATORS NOTES

## TRESTMAN TAKES THE "O"



**Marc Trestman** was hired as the Ravens' offensive coordinator on Jan. 20, replacing Gary Kubiak. Trestman, the former Chicago Bears' head coach (2013-14), is a 31-year coaching veteran who has 20 years of NFL coaching experience, including eight as an offensive coordinator (see chart below).

During his time in the NFL, he has helped teams to eight playoff appearances, two conference championship games and a Super Bowl berth (XXXVII as offensive coordinator of the Raiders).

- In the five seasons prior to his Chicago arrival, Trestman was a head coach in the Canadian Football League, leading the Montreal Alouettes to back-to-back Grey Cup Championships in 2009 and 2010. He was named the CFL's Coach of the Year in 2009.
- In its first year (2013) under Trestman, Chicago's "O" posted several records by gaining a franchise-best 6,109 net yards. The 2013 Bears also finished second in team history with 445 points.
- QBs Jay Cutler and Josh McCown both had career years in 2013, with McCown setting the single-season franchise record in passer rating (109.0) and completion pct. (66.5), while Cutler finished second in Bears single-season history with a 63.1 completion %.
- In 2013, Pro Bowl RB Matt Forte ranked second in the NFL with 1,339 rushing yards and was third in yards from scrimmage (1,933), while Pro Bowl WRs Alshon Jeffery & Brandon Marshall were sixth and 11th, respectively, in NFL receiving yards.

**Dean Pees**, a 12-year NFL-coaching veteran, was promoted to defensive coordinator on Jan. 27, 2012, after guiding the Ravens' LBs for two seasons. He is the sixth "D" coordinator in franchise history. Pees, who was New England's "D" coordinator from 2006-09, leads a Baltimore unit that in 2014 allowed the NFL's sixth-fewest points (18.9) and the eighth-fewest yards (336.9) per game.

- In the Ravens' last 10 playoff games (since the 2010 season), Flacco is 196-of-327 for 2,563 yards, 24 TDs and 4 INTs (104.1 rating). He has led the Ravens to a 7-3 record in these contests.
- In Baltimore's last six playoff games (5-1 record), Flacco has thrown 17 TDs and 2 INTs. Completing 119 of 200 passes for 1,691 yards, he owns a magnificent 111.1 QB rating.

- Flacco has thrown at least 2 TDs in eight-straight playoff games, marking the longest streak in NFL postseason history.
- Flacco has 24 career postseason TD passes, the most in a player's first seven seasons in NFL playoff history.
- Flacco's streak of 197 passes without throwing an INT in the postseason (from 1/22/12 to 1/10/15) is the second longest in NFL playoff history (Drew Brees, 226). Joe Montana (179 from 1989-91) and Steve Young (173 from 1994-96) are third and fourth, respectively.
- Among active passers, Flacco's 25 playoff TD passes rank as the NFL's third most (Tom Brady - 53 and Peyton Manning - 38).
- Flacco's 3,223 career passing yards in the playoffs rank fifth most among active quarterbacks (Tom Brady - 7,345; Peyton Manning - 6,800; Drew Brees - 3,539 and Ben Roethlisberger - 3,484).
- Flacco's 10 career playoff victories (since 2008) are the most among NFL quarterbacks during this time.

But in their absence, young players like **G Ryan Jensen**, **LT James Hurst** and **C John Urschel** have filled in admirably. Here are a few notes about the standout O-line group:

- Baltimore permitted just 19 sacks in 2014, the second fewest in team history (17 in 2006) and in the NFL (Denver, 17). This season, the Ravens have allowed just 19 sacks, tied (Ari.) for the NFL's fifth fewest.
- The Ravens have allowed just .035 sacks per pass play since 2014, ranking as the NFL's best figure (Oakland is second at .040).
- In 2014, **RB Justin Forsett** produced a career-high 1,266 rushing yards (NFL's fifth most) and led the league with a team-record 17 rushes of 20-plus yards, earning his first Pro Bowl, while **QB Joe Flacco** had a career-best passing yards (3,986) and TD passes (27).

## JUST FOR KICKS



Pro Bowl **K Justin Tucker** ranks as the NFL's third-most accurate kicker of all time. He's connected on 123 of 141 FGAs to produce an 87.2 success rate.

- In 2013, he made his first Pro Bowl by setting team records in FGs made (38) and FGAs (41), with both figures tying (Stephen Gostkowski) for the NFL's most.

Tucker also had a franchise-record 140 points (tied for sixth in NFL).

- In addition to his 2013 Pro Bowl, Tucker was named Special Teams Player of the Month (November) and AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times in 2013. In 2014, he was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week (Week 3) and Month (November).

- Tucker made 33-straight FGs at one point during the 2013 season, ranking as the NFL's fifth-longest streak of all time.

- His 6 FGs on 12/16/13 at Det. set a team record and were a single-game NFL high in 2013. Against the Lions, he became the first NFL kicker ever to connect from the 20-, 30-, 40-, 50- & 60-yard range in a game.

- Tuck has earned two AFC Player of the Week honors in 2015 (Week 4 at Pit. & Week 8 vs. SD, both contests in which he hit game-winners).

- He is now 51-of-57 during his career when the Ravens are losing a game, and he's 37-of-41 when Baltimore is down by 7 points or fewer. The Pro Bowler is 26-of-33 in the last 2 minutes of a half during his career, and he's 47-of-53 in the fourth quarter.

## JOHN HARBAUGH MONDAY PRESS CONFERENCE

**Opening statement:** “OK, good to see you guys – appreciate you coming out. We had a chance to obviously study [Sunday’s game video]. We’re on to Seattle right now, working hard on that game plan. Nothing has really changed much from last night after watching the tape. There were no real surprises on the tape – kind of what we expected to see based on what we talked about after the game. We’ll make the corrections tomorrow when the guys come in. We’ll go to work like we always do and try to improve and play better than we did last week and get ready to play a big game against a really good team at home.”

**One thing we hear all the time when we talk about players on other teams is how much you liked them when they were coming out of the draft in their draft year. One guy you obviously liked – because you have him – is RB Javorius “Buck” Allen. What stood out about him when he wasn’t yet a Raven? What stood out about him back then? (Joe Platania)** “That’s a great question. The thing that jumped out to me was his elusiveness. I thought he had elusiveness, and he had really good vision and then the ability to do something about it. He can take his lower body away from a tackle. He could lower his pads in college. It just looked to me like he was going to be a good pro running back. I thought he looked a little bit like some of the guys that have been in the stretch-zone scheme in the past down in Houston and places like that. I thought he would fit our scheme, and it’s good to see that that’s happened.”

**We were just told – or the announcement – about TE Nick Boyle being suspended for the final four games. With TE Maxx Williams and TE Crockett Gillmore both not playing – or finishing the game – where does that leave you at that tight end? (Jamison Hensley)** “I think Maxx and Crockett both have a really good chance to play. We’ll see how that goes. Maxx tells me he’s playing. He’s going through concussion protocol, so that’s always going to be something that’s hard to determine, but he’s a guy that [we are] pretty certain he’s going to play. We’ll see how it goes. And Crockett is the same way. Crockett has had a myriad of nicks and bruises and contusions and all those kind of things like that, and this is another one. It’ll just be day to day. He will not have to practice to play, for sure. With our situation at tight end, if he can play, he’s going to be out there playing. That’s just the kind of guy he is. We’ll just have to play it day by day. And then we’ll bring some guys in to make sure we have backup tight ends. We’re going to have tight ends here. Konrad Reuland is here. He has been practicing with us pretty much all year – knows what we are doing – and he can play the position. Of course, Kyle [Juszczyk] fits into all those heavy-type groups. We have a guy we’re bringing in – so we’ll see how that goes in the next day – who is familiar with our system, who can definitely play and block and do those things. We’re not going to get away from those types of packages. Those are very important to us, and we’ll stay in that stuff.”

**Is there anything you can tell us about ... You were obviously disappointed with what TE Nick Boyle did – and I know it is a sensitive subject – but was it [that he] mistakenly used something? Did this catch you by surprise? (Dave Ginsburg)** “I don’t really want to comment on it. You can ask Nick. He can share whatever it was. I can tell you this: It wasn’t like steroids or anything like that. When I first heard about it, that was my first thought: ‘Man, I hope it’s not something like that.’ It’s nothing like that. He can confirm what it was. It’s pretty common. It’s what you read about all the time with guys. I don’t think he realized that it was something he shouldn’t be doing. Or if he did, he didn’t think it through. I’ve talked to him, and he was telling me how stupid it was, and I agreed. It was pretty dumb. Hopefully, he’ll grow and learn from that. The shame of it is here’s a guy that’s playing so well. This guy is playing really well. He’s one of the gems of the draft class in terms of a fifth-round pick playing the way he does. He plays hard. He has been good in the pass game, good in the run game – smart, tough. He has a tremendous future. I told him that today, ‘It’s just a shame you’re going to miss four games here. You’re playing like a veteran out there.’ He’ll learn from it – he’s smart – and we’ll move forward.”

**Coach, you talked about the situation yesterday with QB Matt Schaub going down and being looked at with the concussion protocol. Just for clarification, he was looked at during the game, cleared and was able to come back in. At any point, were you close to putting QB Jimmy Clausen in the game because of that situation? (Jerry Coleman)** “Not because of that. [Matt Schaub] got banged around pretty good a couple of times. He took a shot directly to his knee on a forcible hit to his knee. He took a helmet-to-helmet shot at the end – neither of which were called. Those are the two situations that I was looking at. I think we warmed Jimmy up briefly there. But, Matt is tough. He deserves protection just like every other quarterback in this league. As far as the other part of it, I was really proud and impressed with what happened. The protocol was followed to the ‘T.’ We all saw it pretty much on the sideline. Mark [Smith, head certified athletic trainer] was right on it, was right out there.



And then [Matt Schaub] went into the in-game protocol and passed everything. [He] passed after the game and then passed again this morning. So, that was really good to see that [the concussion protocol] worked the way it's supposed to work."

**John, I know the league has said you guys did everything you were supposed to do there, but it was pretty clear on TV when QB Matt Schaub hit his head that he grabs with his hands, clutching his head. I know a timeout was called on the following play, and I assume that's when he was looked at. Would you like to see the league – because they have introduced a spotter – to have a medical timeout system? Looking back at that, do you think the league should have used that to stop play right there? (Luke Jones)** "I don't know. I haven't delved into that too seriously. It's not my area of expertise. I think whatever they do for safety – whatever they feel they need to do – is great. To me, you have one [situation] here that worked. We have experts who went out there and went through the process, and they're very diligent and very conscious of concussions right now. That's something that everybody is thinking about. I know mistakes have been made – I understand that – but I think you trust professionals to do their job and respect the fact that they know what they're doing, and they did a good job on this one. So, we feel good about that."

**John, three-straight home games. What are you looking to accomplish besides the wins? Will you tell the guys at all about a spoiler's role? You've got three contenders coming in – you can certainly derail their Wild Card chances – or is it all about your team? (Dave Ginsburg)** "It's all about our team. We don't really get too involved in that kind of thinking – never have. I don't think that's much of a motivator for anybody. I don't think anybody thinks our guys aren't going to play. When you watch our guys play – I've said this before, and I told them this in the locker room – I couldn't be more proud of them. You can talk about outcomes – and that's the bottom line, no doubt about it – but in terms of doing everything possible to try to win a football game, in terms of heart, courage, toughness, playing hard, running to the ball on both sides of the ball, being physical, doing all the things that make you proud as a coach – they're doing that. I couldn't be more proud of them. I'm proud of the firemen [who help in the operations department]. I'm proud of the trainers. I'm proud of the equipment guys. I'm proud of the coaches. I'm proud of the general manager, the scouts. I'm proud of everybody. I'm proud of the team president, because everybody is handling a very difficult season without blinking, without backing up one inch, and [they are] charging into next week. That's what we're going to continue to do for the next four weeks. Miracles do happen in terms of outcomes, but I don't care about any of that other than the fact that we're going to go out there and win a football game this week. That's what we plan on doing, that's what we're going to prepare to do, and that's what we are going to do. It's not going to change. It's the same thing I said Week 2, Week 3, Week 4, right on through, because that's the kind of men we have in this program. I don't know what else you can say besides that, because that's a fact."

**Can you talk about the play S Kendrick Lewis made at the end to get that strip? It was lost in the outcome, but it was a very good play. (Ryan Mink)** "There are two pretty incredible plays in that game. When you talk about running-to-the-football-type plays and effort plays, that was one of them. They popped a run on us. They cut it back. It was a nice little scheme – the first run they had in a while. And our whole defense turned and ran after the ball. Kendrick Lewis, Courtney Upshaw on the backside – the whole defense pursued. We had five guys around the ball, and that's why we came up with the ball, too. It was a great effort play by Kendrick and the whole defense. Every single guy was running to the ball. And then Buck's play – where he caught the ball and then ran for the touchdown – he did a great job of making people miss, but there were three guys who turned and got upfield and sprinted in front of him and made blocks – three receivers, a tight end and receivers – that were out on the route with linemen chasing from behind. Matter of fact, one of our linemen – De'Ondre Wesley that was at right tackle for that series – chased him all the way into the end zone. That's who we are as a football team."

**John, T Eugene Monroe has missed the past couple of games with a shoulder [injury]. Would it get to the point where he might not be able to come back this year, and how difficult has it been juggling the left tackle position? (Jamison Hensley)** "Yes, it has been a real challenge. Give James Hurst all the credit in the world. He deserves it and has come in there and started for us a number of games. It's just unfortunate for Eugene. He has had the shoulder issues that have been nagging him. I think he's up for another MRI on Wednesday. Between him, his doctor and his agent, he'll have to make a decision about whether he wants to play with it for the rest of the year."

**With QB Matt Schaub getting dinged up, there were some fans that were maybe excited to see QB Jimmy Clausen come in with all the pick-sixes and everything like that. Is that a thought for you guys at all maybe switching quarterback to Jimmy? (Matt Stevens)** "I think it'll depend on Matt – where Matt is at – and how ready he is to play. Matt looks like he's going to be



able to play. He was bounced around pretty good in the game – too much. We’ll see how he makes it through the week, but I think he’s going to be OK. He’s a tough guy. We’re planning on Matt being the quarterback.” (Reporter: “Even moving forward there’s no thought for you guys?”) “I didn’t say that. There are always thoughts on everything, so we’ll consider everything. Matt is the quarterback; Jimmy is the backup quarterback.”

**Is it possible, John, that QB Matt Schaub may not be able to practice at least part of this week to get some rest so he is ready to go Sunday? (Jeff Zrebiec)** “It is, which will give us a chance to get Jimmy [Clausen] the reps in there, which will help him, too. I don’t think Matt needs the reps to play in the game. It’s going to be the same offense we’ve been running.”

**Do you get the feeling that some of the players might be excited about having three straight at home – even before the short trip to Cincy – getting to play three straight, get into a pattern of playing on their own field? (Dave Ginsburg)** “It will be good. We’ve had a bunch of games on the road, obviously. I guess if you do the math, we’ve had ... We’ve already had seven of our road games and five of our home games, so this will be great. We love playing at home. I’m really hopeful the fans are with us. I’m really hopeful that the fans – the Ravens fans – take the situation for what it is and recognize the way we’re playing. It’s a team that’s fighting like crazy, and a team that can win games. It’s a team that’s capable of winning games. The difference in that game was two crazy plays and a couple calls. That’s what it comes down to in this league all the time, and it hasn’t been going our way. All season long it hasn’t been going our way. We don’t make excuses. It’s our job to create our own good fortune. We understand that, and we strive for that. You can’t throw picks, and you can’t throw picks that go all the way back to the house no matter if they get tipped – or whatever happens – or bounce the right way. I’ve seen lots of those things bounce harmlessly to the ground in our games and other games, but it just hasn’t been our lot this year that way. That’s the way it goes, and you have to find a way to overcome it. You get calls that go against you. It’s just the way it goes. I’d love to see the data on that, in terms of who’s getting more calls against them that are wrong. But that’s not an excuse; that’s just a fact. Those are things you have to find a way to overcome. As fans, look at the heart, look at the effort, look at the competitiveness, look at the young guys playing the way they’re playing, and hopefully come out and support them and be really loud about it. Make it fun. Make it a Ravens football game. Let’s make it tough on this team coming in here. Let’s let them feel what it’s like to come play in Baltimore. I hope our fans feel that way.”

**What have you seen from the defense over the past four games? It looks like they have been cracking down on yardage, specifically fewer big plays. Other than that, when you watch the defense as a whole, what improvements have you seen them make? (Ryan Mink)** “I see more disciplined play. We’ve had very few breakdowns in the back end. We’ve had a few, but very few compared to earlier in the year. I see better tackling. For the most part, I see really good tackling. Our front is dominating upfront, and we are running to the football. That has gotten better every single week for about the last four or five weeks – say four weeks. It has gotten progressively and steadily better. To me, when you run to the football with your hair on fire like your life depends on it, you have a chance to be a really good defense.”

**John, I know that WR Daniel Brown’s catch was wiped out, but he seems like a guy who, even though he’s not a speed person, finds a way to get open. Can you just talk about that? And I think, also, he may have had block on RB Javorius Allen’s run. Can you just talk about Daniel’s skills as a player? (Cliff Brown)** “Dan Brown is a guy that is really ... Every time you put him out there in practice, he does something good, and he’s a guy that came out of nowhere. He’s kind of a throw-in, camp free agent-type guy, who came out the first day and started making plays. Then you watch and see if he can sustain it, and he did; and he sustained it throughout the course of the season. You finally get to the point where it’s like, ‘This guy deserves a shot’ – circumstances with Marlon [Brown] getting hurt and things like that – and he goes out there and makes plays in the game. So, it’s pretty neat. It’s obviously not too big for him, because he made the same plays in the game that he made in practice. And he’s blocking people, he’s getting out front, he’s hustling, and he’s physical. [We are] excited about what he’s doing right now.”

**John, do you have any update on QB Joe Flacco’s surgery situation? I know you guys were waiting for the swelling to go down. (Jon Meoli)** “I do. We received the update. [Senior vice president of public and community relations] Kevin [Byrne] and I were walking in, and we received the update from [head certified athletic trainer] Mark [Smith]. [Joe Flacco] is going to have surgery tomorrow [at] 10 o’clock with Dr. [James] Andrews down in Alabama, and he was there today to get his pre-surgical examination done.”



John, how much motivation have you and this organization gained from defensive line coach Clarence Brooks? Clarence talked earlier about his cancer battle, what he was going through off the field. How much inspiration has he provided for this organization with how he has handled this situation? *(Jeff Zrebiec)* "That's a great question. It's amazing the things that happen during the course of a football season, because you have a group of people that live so closely together. I can look back at every season, and there have been these moments that are just personal moments that you share with people that you love and you care about; and Clarence Brooks found out that he was going to have to deal with this cancer issue early on in the season and shared it with the team. Nobody said a word about it to anybody, because it was a family matter, and that's the way he wanted it. And he has been going and getting his chemotherapy and his radiation treatments three days a week, hasn't been able to make the two Monday night trips, because he had the treatments on Mondays, and we had chance to pray for him and be there with him, laugh with him and listen about all the stories he told us. The coaches had a celebration; we had a couple of cakes. He likes ice cream cakes, so we had a couple ice cream cakes up there last week when he had his last treatment on Wednesday. And he took us through the process and the people he had met in the chemo treatments, the friends he had made, and what other people are going through, and it just puts it in perspective, once again, the things that are important. I say all the time, 'Football is a metaphor for life.' The challenges that you face are *similar* to what people face in life, but there are people out there facing things that are just [so important] – adversity, challenging, demanding, difficult things that they're facing – that this brings close to our home through Clarence. Maybe a season like this gives you a chance to think about some things as a coach or as players, things that are going to stick with you for the rest of your life." *(Reporter: "For many years, it has been pretty obvious. I think to myself, everybody who has come through ... His guys love playing for him.")* "Yes." *(Reporter: "What is it about him, from a personal sense, that elicits that?")* "That's a great, great point. Clarence Brooks ... First of all, he's the best defensive line coach I've ever seen, and I've been around some good ones. He is a guy that ... He gets on them, he's demanding [and] he asks for their very best. He's very clear in what he wants; he has a way he teaches it, and he wants it done that way. He's not accepting 'no' for an answer. He's not accepting 'can't' – can't, won't, don't, won't. Those are not options, and when it's not done exactly right, man, you hear him going off down there on those guys. And you can just see them chuckling and laughing and shaking their heads, and they love it. They just love it, because I think they know he cares so much about them. He cares about them like they're his own kids. Like a guy like Clarence – when a guy shows you how much he cares about you because he's willing to let you know the truth and get it out of you every single day – how can you not appreciate that? Maybe it's a grandfather now, not a dad. Maybe he's a grandfather at this point. [He is] just a great man, and he's doing a great job. He's coaching, he has his energy, he's coaching them up, and they're playing well, just like they always do."
